When was the Lutheran Church-- Missouri Synod founded?

On April 26, 1847, 12 pastors from 15 congregations formed The German Evangelical Lutheran Synod of Missouri, Ohio and Other States.

This Synod became the Lutheran Church--Missouri Synod in 1947.



How long was it after our founding that
we called our first missionary to the
Jewish people?

Only 34 years! From early on we had a zeal
to share the gospel with Jewish people.



Jewish missions begins in the LC—MS

1881—Convention

1882—Daniel Landsmann in Springfield

1883—Sent to Lower East Side of Manhattan

1896—37 Jewish were people brought to faith by his ministry.

1896—One of them was Rabbi Nathaniel Friedmann.



Jewish missions continues in the LC—MS

1896-1941—Nathaniel Friedmann (Minneapolis/St. Paul)

1930-1934—Isadore Schwartz (Chicago)

1930-1934—Kenneth Frankenstein (St. Louis)

November 9-10, 1938—Kristallnacht changes everything

November 10, 1483—Martin Luther's date of birth

Two-covenant theology—Franz Rosenzweig

July 7, 1913—all-night discussion with friend Eugen Rosenstock-Huessy,

Luther's 1543 booklet "On the Jews and their Lies"

Luther's 1523 treatise "That Jesus Christ was born a Jew"

February 15, 1546—three days before Luther's death, his final sermon...



Our Voice is stilled...

“We want to act in a Christian way toward them [the Jews] and offer them first of all the Christian faith, that they might accept the Messiah, who, after all, is their kinsman and born of their flesh and blood and is of the real seed of Abraham of which they boast... We still want to treat them with Christian love and to pray for them, so that they might become converted and would receive the Lord.” --Luther, 1546

1973—Convention resolution—St. Luke's Lutheran Church, Philadelphia,
Pastor Bruce Lieske

Referred to Rev. Dr. Erv Kolb, Evangelism

1974—First meeting of ad hoc committee on Jewish Evangelism

1975—First edition of "Witnessing to Jewish People" by Rev. Bruce Lieske



Modern Jewish missions in the LC—MS

1976—The American Jewish Committee led by Rabbi James Rudin

Moishe Rosen—Jews for Jesus, San Francisco, California

1976—Steve Cohen, lay missionary for Jews for Jesus



Modern Jewish missions in the LC—MS

The Committee on Witnessing to the Jewish People becomes the Task Force for Jewish Missions and is moved from the Board of Parish Services to the Synod's Board for Mission Services.

1981—Lutheran Institute for Jewish Evangelism, Rev. Bruce Lieske, Exec. Dir.

1988—Rev. John Perling, Beverly Hills, CA

1988—Milt Kohut, first full-time missionary as a result of the 1973 res.



Modern Jewish missions in the LC—MS

1981-1993 Rev. Bruce Lieske (Wisconsin) (Lutheran Institute for Jewish Evangelism, adopted "The Apple of His Eye" (Deut. 32:10) as its street name.

1988-1990—Milt Kohut (Los Angeles)

1988-2008—Marc Danzís (NYC—Beth El Messianic Congregation LC—MS)

1990-1991—Dave Tengbom (Los Angeles)

1992-1996—Darla Schmidt (Chicago)

1993-2005—Rev. Bruce Lieske, Apple of His Eye, FL/GA (Orlando)

Name of the organization is officially changed to
Lutherans in Jewish Evangelism (LIJE)



Modern Jewish missions in the LC—MS

1996—Steve Cohen, Jennifer Krupp and Kevin Parviz begin the Missionary Training Center in St. Louis

September 22, 1996—The Apple of His Eye Mission Society Inaugural Svc.

1997—Conflict/confusion arises...Steve Cohen leaves LIJE but keeps the “Apple” name, Jennifer Krupp leaves mission.

1997—Rev. Kevin Parviz begins The Apple of His Eye-Missouri as new mission for church plant Congregation Chai v’Shalom, continues to work with Steve Cohen and Rev. Bruce Lieske.



Modern Jewish missions in the LC—MS

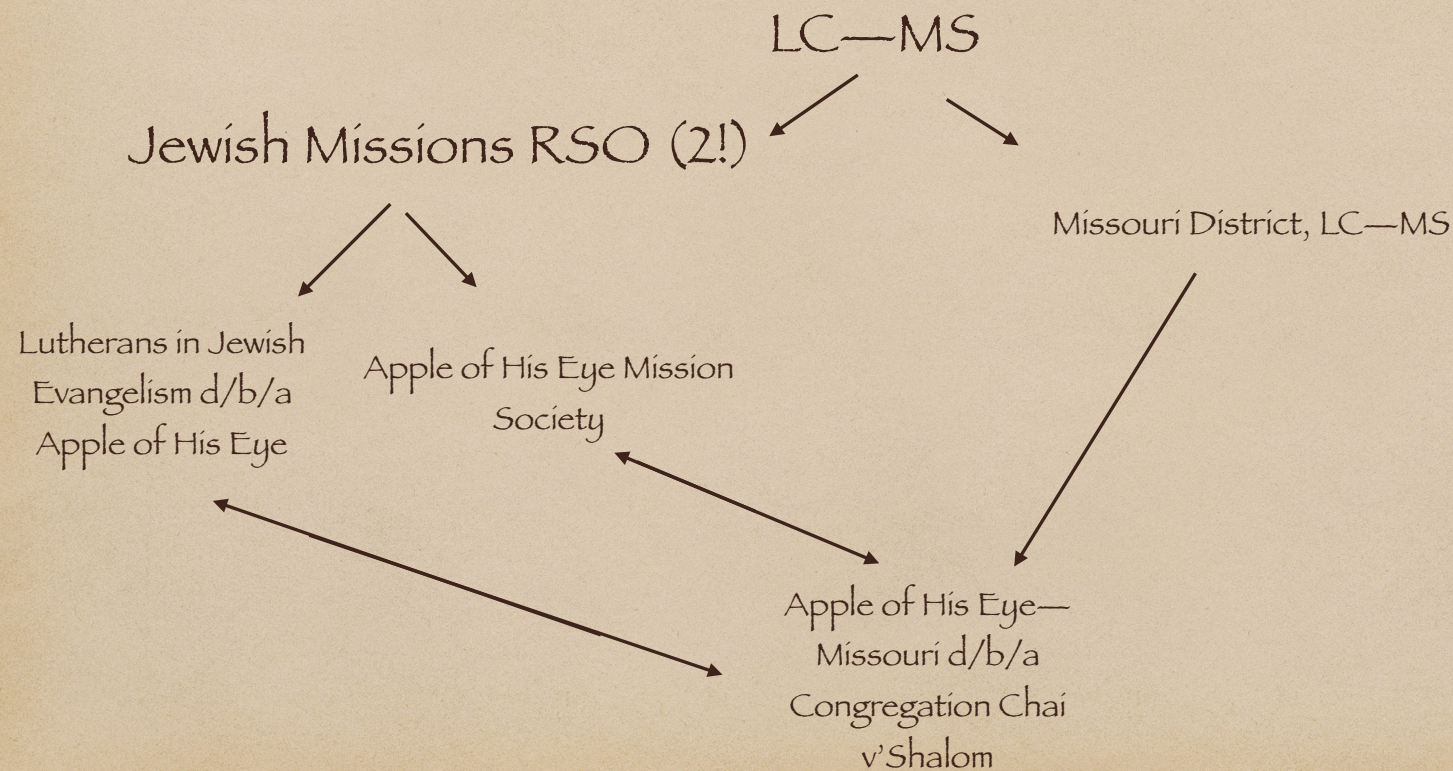
1998—as a result of the confusion, Board for Mission Services no longer includes Jewish missions.

April 18, 1998—Inaugural worship service for Congregation Chai v'Shalom

August 22, 1998—Rev. Kevin Parviz becomes first certified Church Planter and Missionary-at-Large for the Missouri District.

Modern Jewish missions in the LC—MS

1996-Present—Rev. Kevin Parviz (St. Louis)

1998-Present—Congregation Chai v'Shalom (St. Louis)

1999-Present—New branch of ministry for LIJE, adopted new street name of Burning Bush Ministries (Detroit)

March, 2005—Rev. Bruce Lieske retires, Rev. Kevin Parviz, Exec. Dir. LIJE



Modern Jewish missions in the LC—MS

2010—Rev. Kermit Rickenberg is called to replace retiring Rev. Bruce Lieske as director of Orlando branch and to begin new fund-raising model for LIJE, Books for Missions (now Support for Missions & new branch of Aish Ha Emeth.

2019—Linda Morris (Dodi Yavoh) comes full-time to LIJE to serve our ministry in Israel.
